





## Friday - Maths

Today we are going to be adding amount of money.

You need to look for the items people have bought and add them together to find the total amount of money they will spend in the shop.

Here are the items:



1. Alia went to the shop. She bought some football boots and a teddy. How much money did she spend?

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2. Lee went to the shop. He bought a toy car and some football boots. How much money did he spend?

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3. Zaynab went to the shop. She bought a doll and some flip flops. How much money did she spend?

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4. Cindy went to the shop. She bought a bike, a toy car and a teddy. How much did she spend?

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5. Polly went to the shop. She bought a bike and 2 teddy bears. How much did she spend?

## Friday-English

A **command** is a type of **sentence** in which someone is being told to do something.

- Commands usually start with an **imperative verb** (a verb which is bossy and tells people what to do).
- They need to start with a capital letter, like any other sentence.
- They need to have a full stop at the end.
- You can sometimes use an exclamation mark at the end instead if you want to show that the person is shouting or their emotion.

### Examples:

**Make** your bed when you wake up.

Tilly, **brush** your teeth before you go to bed.

**Come** and sit on the carpet.

These sentences are all telling someone **to do** something.

Let's practice some handwriting!

Handwriting is a mindful and relaxing activity. It can be really peaceful and help to focus your mind when there are lots of things going on. Maybe you could listen to some relaxing music while you write.

Remember when you are practicing your handwriting, **all of your letters must start and finish on the line.**

Ascenders (tall letters) go all the way or very close to the line above it, like this:
